Prayers for our Parishioners. The particular law of the Byzantine Ruthenian Metropolitan Church directs that the pastor is to offer the Divine Liturgy for the people of the parish entrusted to him on Sundays and days of precept [holy days of obligation]" (canon 294). This liturgy intention for all parishioners is "For the Intention of Parishioners." The faithful who attend the Divine Liturgy for the parishioners who participate, according to their state, in praying for that intention. We can continue this prayer for one another during the week by remembering several parishioners and families each week. Lazarus Saturday and Palm Sunday. The Great Fast of forty days was completed Friday. There is a two-day joyful and triumphal interval between the completion of the Great Fast and the beginning of Great and Holy Week. The resurrection of Lazarus by his Friend Jesus, the God-Man, is a prophecy in the form of an action of divine power. It prophesies Jesus' own resurrection, and shows that Jesus' resurrects by His own power. Also, as God, Jesus knows that raising Lazarus will set the plans to take His life. This is a prophetic explanation why He came into the world to suffer and die in order to resurrect His friends from death. On Palm Sunday, Jesus enters Jerusalem, the capital of the Holy

Land, as victorious King, and Prophet, and Priest. The Lord Jesus comes not only out of the past event but also comes to us out of the future. We participate in welcoming our Savior who came to Jerusalem but also prepare to welcome the Lord who comes again beginning the Parousia. Great Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday is set apart to be vigilant to welcome Christ the Bridegroom of His Church.

Fasting Regulations. Great Wednesday and Great Saturday are days of abstinence, that is, no meat or meat products are consumed. Great Friday is a day of strict fast, that is, no meat or meat products, and no milk and dairy products are consumed.

Guarding the Tomb. Each year our parish keeps the ancient tradition of a vigil at the grave of our Lord Jesus Christ from Great Friday after Vespers until Vespers and Liturgy on Great Saturday. The hours of the vigil are from 10:00 PM Friday until 5:00 PM Saturday. There is a signup sheet in the Narthex of the church on the bulletin board closest to the usher's room. Please choose your hour when you and your family can spend time in prayer together. In this way we shall not leave the tomb unguarded.

BCY Jerusalem Matins. The BCY members will pray Jerusalem Matins on Great Friday after Vespers and keep the first watch at the tomb from 10:00 PM until 11:00PM.

Blessed Palms and Willows should be kept in your home, usually at the icon corner or crucifix, as a witness to the Lord's presence in your life. Last year's palms and willows are blessed sacramentals and should be destroyed by burning or burying them or

bring them to the hall in the chapel basement and place them in the receptacle provided. ***Do not throw them into the garbage.***

Resurrection Candles. If you would like to offer an Easter candle in remembrance of a departed love one, the intention of living loved ones, or a special intention, please visit the parish office before Tuesday, April 16th, between 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM.

Great Friday Procession. Student-disciples of the Lord from Epiphany ECF School of Religion will bear the instruments of the crucifixion.

Resurrection Procession. Representatives of Epiphany Men's Club, Ladies Guild, BCY, and ECF-School of Religion will carry their respective banners in the procession before Resurrection Matins on Easter Sunday.

Traditional Blessing of Paschal Foods will take place Great Saturday after Vespers and Divine Liturgy and Easter Sunday after the Divine Liturgy.

Condolences. We offer our condolences to Janet Semonick and her family upon the death of her husband, George Semonick. Reception of mourners will be tomorrow in the narthex of Epiphany Church from 10:00 AM to 11:00 AM. The Funeral Service will be tomorrow at 11:00 AM with interment at Fairfax Memorial Park and the Mercy Meal will follow at Epiphany Parish Center. Palm Sunday Procession. We thank the children and teens of Epiphany ECF-School of Religion for leading the procession to

welcome our Lord as King of the Kingdom of God at the 8:00 AM Divine Liturgy today. The gospel testifies that "the children crying out in the temple area 'Hosanna to the Son of David'" (Matthew 21:15) is the source of this practice. The Spanish nun Egeria in her *Diary of a Pilgrim* (A.D. 394 to 417) was an eyewitness to the procession on Palm Sunday in Jerusalem in those years. She wrote, "All the children who are present here, including those who are not yet able to walk because they are too young and therefore are carried on their parents' shoulder, all of them bear palm branches, some carrying palms, others olive branches" (Chapter 31). The procession takes place at the Great Entrance because Byzantine commentaries on the Divine Liturgy state "This ceremony [The Great Entrance] signifies the last manifestation of Christ...He rode into the Holy City on the back of a donkey, escorted by a cheering crowd." (Nicholas Cabasilas, Commentary, Chapter III).

Easter Egg Hunt. The BCY will once again hold its annual Easter Egg Hunt on Easter morning immediately following the Divine Liturgy and food blessing. Eggs will be scattered on Epiphany's grounds with a special area set aside for younger children.

Trash & Recycling. In October 2018 our monthly trash services rates were raised \$180 more. In January we were presented with a cost effective way to continue our trash and recycling service. Using this method we are able to save \$250 each month on our trash and recycling services. After discussion with Fr. John, Joel, the councilors, Mrs. O'Brien, Carousel Day Care owner, it was decided to go forward with the switch. The containers delivered last week will be the receptacles for the boxes. Delivery and pickup of 8 yard dumpsters has been coordinated to take place on the same day without any lapse in service. An announcement appeared in the bulletin February 3, 2019. An email also was sent to all the officers of the parish organizations.

Mysteries (Sacraments) of Initiation - (Baptism, Chrismation, Holy Eucharist). We follow the command of the Lord to baptize in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:19). Chrismation (Confirmation) and Holy Eucharist (First Holy Communion) is imparted at the same time immediately following baptism

Mysteries (Sacraments) of Initiation of Infants – is scheduled at the Divine Liturgy on Saturdays or Sundays during the year except certain fast periods. Sponsors must be Catholics in good standing and supply a sponsor card attesting to that from their parish. While two Catholics in good standing is usual, one baptized non-Catholic can function as a Christian Witness with the Catholic sponsor. Both must be at least sixteen years of age. Details are available at the parish office.

Mysteries (Sacraments) of Initiation of Adults – follows a period of catechumenate. This is a period of spiritual formation. Please see the priest or deacon.

Mystery (Sacrament) of Crowning in Marriage – According to the Pastoral Policy and Guidelines for Marriage Preparation for the Catholic Church in New Jersey, couples wishing to marry must inform the pastor one year before the date of the wedding and be free to marry in the Catholic Church. Couples will meet with the priest and deacon in four sessions – to begin the pre-nuptial investigation, to take FOCUS, a communications, values and religious inventory approved for use in the Catholic dioceses/eparchies, to complete the pre-nuptial investigation and for a session on the theology of the mystery (sacrament). They are also required to attend Pre-Cana or Engaged Encounter.

Mystery (Sacrament) of Repentance – The Mystery (Sacrament) of Repentance is regularly available each Saturday 11:30 AM – 12:00 Noon. In addition, confessions are heard during the Christmas Fast (Advent) and the Great Fast (Lent) on Sundays between the Divine Liturgies. Visiting confessors are also scheduled at special times during the Great Fast. Confessions are also heard on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Great and Holy Week to prepare for the observance of the Lord's Resurrection.

Anointing of the Sick – Parishioners who are seriously ill and those with life endangering medical conditions as well as those who are to undergo surgery should avail themselves of the sacrament of penance and anointing of the sick. If surgery is scheduled, please consider confession and anointing at the church before entering the hospital since there is more privacy for confession and less chance of interruption for confession and anointing. If you are unable to come to church, please call the rectory. Families of parishioners who have a medical emergency should contact the rectory office so one of the priests can go the hospital.

Holy Communion and Visitation of the Sick – Holy Communion is brought to our parishioners who are ill at the hospital or at home by the deacon on Sundays and at other times by arrangement. Please contact the deacon or the rectory office by Friday prior to the Sunday communion visitation.

Funeral Services – The Office of Christian Burial is offered in ways to accommodate the needs of the family. The Epiphany Ladies Guild as part of their charity offers a Mercy Meal for families at the Parish Center following the interment. Epiphany of our Lord cemetery is a portion of Fairfax Memorial Park. Parishioners who are interested in purchasing cemetery plots should see the deacon.

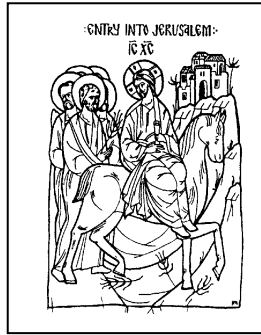

Meditation on Today's Readings



Flowery Sunday/Palm Sunday

"Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, even the king of Israel."
John 12:1-17

Each of the four gospels contains a narrative of the festive entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem before His crucifixion and being acclaimed as Messiah by the people. For the Divine Liturgy on Palm Sunday the holy fathers have appointed the account according to the evangelist John. While the account recorded in the gospel according to John is sparse in detail it does give the eyewitness testimony of the dinner in the house of Martha, Mary and Lazarus of the Saturday evening before the entrance and thereby reveals the motive for the plot against Jesus, namely, the raising of His

friend, Lazarus, from the dead.

Although Jesus has been predicting His voluntary death during the forty days Jesus, the Twelve and the disciples have journeyed from Mount Tabor, it seems that it is only Mary of Bethany who understands the words Jesus has spoken. She recognizes that for her brother to live Jesus will die. Therefore, she anoints His feet with spikenard valued at almost a year's wage. The comment that the house was filled with the odor is surely the testimony of one present, John himself. Mary of Bethany anoints Jesus feet—she does not anoint His head like the prophets of the Old Testament did when they made someone a king because she knows His identity and she cannot make Him what He already is. By anointing His feet she declares what He already is—King and Messiah—and at the same time, Jesus explains what He knows is Mary's other motive, she is preparing His body for burial following the death that is sure to come because Jesus has raised her brother from the dead.

From His birth in Bethlehem there have been those committed to and directly opposed to Jesus. The dinner highlights it with the complaint of Judas. This is followed by the detail about the plot to put Jesus to death contrasted with the triumphant entrance into Jerusalem.

The people take branches and welcome Jesus as the conqueror over death with the Biblical prayer "Hosanna" that is, Save us, we pray, and the words from the psalm "Blessed is He".

We disciples of Jesus have asked Him to raise us from death and give us immortal life with Him. We accept that He must die to give us what we ask. Those who oppose Jesus may want to hurt the friends of Jesus, also. We must always try to invite them to a change of mind. We must be on guard against temptations to deny or betray our Lord. Greater people than we were tested in these events and so shall we. Let us pray for grace to remain firm in our profession of faith, in hope, and in love until our final breath.

*Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice! Your kindness should be known to all.
The Lord is near.*
Philippians 4:4-9

Saint Paul is writing to the church at Philippi, the first European church he established, a city in Greece that had many retired military living in it. This epistle is filled with exhortations to remain faithful despite the difficulties that they were experiencing. Saint Paul also is writing for them to put their faith into action, for them to follow the teachings of Christ and to imitate him.

The Holy Spirit, who is the true author of the epistle, encourages the Christians of Philippi to be filled with joy because despite the difficulties surrounding them, the Lord Jesus is even closer than the difficulties. The peace of God will guard them and support them. How does a Christian deal with the pressures of daily life? By the peace that comes from faith that the Lord is near, by refusing to worry, by persevering in prayer and by living truthfully, justly, with purity, with graciousness, that is, like Christ, is the way to deal with these pressures.

With our faith in God, even if it is weak, like the father's in today's gospel, with hope in the promise of God fulfilled in Jesus, and because of God's love for us, we continue to follow Jesus to the cross and we will attain the resurrection.

The holy fathers who appointed this epistle reading for Palm Sunday must have done so because the exhortation to "Rejoice" echoes the same word written by the prophet Zechariah, "Rejoice, heartily, O daughter Zion, shout for joy, O daughter, Jerusalem! See, your king shall come to you; a just savior is he, meek and riding on an ass." This is quoted in the Gospels as being fulfilled by the Lord Jesus on Palm Sunday. The other passage that refers to Palm Sunday is "the Lord is near." The Lord is lord over everything. As the Bible says in Exodus, "The Lord Himself will fight for you; you have only to keep still." The Lord will offer His life in sacrifice for us.
